### "Starting With the Empty Tomb"

**D**uring the season of Lent, a group of us have been gathering online via Zoom to

discuss Richard Rohr's most recent book, The Universal Christ. It is a groundbreaking book (a New York Times Best-selling book, in fact) that deals with both the message of Jesus and the meaning of the word "Christ". In the book, Rohr reminds us that "Christ"

isn't Jesus' last name; it's something more. He offers this transformative thought—that Christ is "another name for everything" OR "a name for the transcendent within of every 'thing' in the universe." As he explores this theme, not only does he invite the reader to consider how we might see the face of Christ in all things, but he also explores what it looks like to participate in this "Christ reality" as followers in the way of

Jesus. It is a beautiful reflection on the Christian faith and has enlightened me on matters pertaining to faith, love, and grace.

Not surprisingly, many of Rohr's reflections shine a light on what it means to be an "Easter people"; people who are learning to walk in the light of the resurrection. What does it look like to participate in God's resurrection story? Perhaps a good place to start is something that Rohr mentions in the book. Early in the book Rohr highlights the work of St. Bonaventure (1221–1274), who "taught that to work up to loving God, start by loving the very humblest and simplest

things, and then move up from there." I can't think of a better way to begin the Easter season. The gospel writers invite us to begin with an empty tomb and instruct us to "move up from there." Like many of Jesus' parables, if we can start with the small things, we will see growth that knows no boundaries. Our faith doesn't begin and end with the empty tomb. The empty tomb is the small thing that leads to something larger. It is the seed that can sprout into something beautiful.

Walking in the light of the resurrection is something we can only do one step at a time. As we walk with

Jesus, we are invited to do something simple: love the small things and move up and out from there. Every time we smile at a stranger, we are participating in the work of the Resurrected Christ. Every time we forgive and offer mercy to those around us, we are participating in the Christ Mystery. The work may seem small (and will often feel insignificant), but when we work

together to participate in the work of Christ, we will see the kind of transformation that God longs to see in the world.

Friends, as you consider how to follow in the way of Jesus this Easter season, begin with the Empty Tomb and move out from there. Learn to love "the very humblest and simplest things, and then move up from there." As you do so, each day will become easier, and you'll see God's light shining brighter. Christ is alive in all things! Alleluia! Amen!




